Dear Christ the King!



Monday, April 4 Martin Luther King, Jr, Civil Rights Leader & Martyr, 1968

Martin Luther King, Jr. was born on January 15, 1929, in Atlanta.

As the son and grandson of Baptist preachers, he was steeped in the Black Church tradition. To this heritage he added a thorough academic preparation, earning the degrees of B.A., B.D., and Ph.D. in Systematic Theology from Boston University.

In 1954, King became pastor of a church in Montgomery, Alabama. There, Black indignation at inhumane treatment on segregated buses culminated in December, 1955, in the arrest of Rosa Parks for refusing to give up her seat to a white man. King was catapulted into national prominence as the leader of the Montgomery bus boycott. He became increasingly the articulate prophet, who could not only rally the Black masses, but could also move the consciences of Whites.

King founded the Southern Christian Leadership Conference to spearhead non-violent mass demonstrations against racism. Many confrontations followed, most notably in Birmingham and Selma, Alabama, and in Chicago. King's campaigns were instrumental to the passage of the Civil Rights Acts of 1964, 1965 and 1968. King then turned his attention to economic empowerment of the poor and opposition to the Vietnam War, contending that racism, poverty and milita-

rism were interrelated.

King lived in constant danger: his home was dynamited, he was almost fatally stabbed, and he was harassed by death threats. He was even jailed 30 times; but through it all he was sustained by his deep faith. In 1957, he received, late at night, a vicious telephone threat. Alone in his kitchen he wept and prayed. He relates that he heard the Lord speaking to him and saying, "Martin Luther, stand up for righteousness, stand up for justice," and promising never to leave him alone—"No, never alone." King refers to his vision as his "Mountain-top Experience."

After preaching at Washington Cathedral on March 31, 1968, King went to Memphis in support of sanitation workers in their struggle for better wages. There, he proclaimed that he had been "to the mountain-top" and had seen "the Promised Land," and that he knew that one day he and his people would be "free at last." On the following day, April 4, he was cut down by an assassin's bullet.

Almighty God, who by the hand of Moses thy servant didst lead thy people out of slavery, and didst make them free at last: Grant that thy Church, following the example of thy prophet Martin Luther King, may resist oppression in the name of thy love, and may strive to secure for all thy children the blessed liberty of the Gospel of Jesus Christ; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.



Leyden Creek Trail

Pattridge Open Space Preserve Between Indiana and HWY 93 on W 82nd Ave. Large dirt parking area on the west end of the trailhead.

Head out on this 1.50 mile, loop trail near Arvada, Colorado. Considered a moderately challenging route that takes about 45 minutes to complete. Alternatively, for a fairly easy walk that avoids going up the hillside, just walk the north side of the loop out and back. This trail is great for hiking and trail running, and it's unlikely you'll encounter many other people while exploring. Dogs are welcome, but must be on a leash. <u>Click here for more info.</u>

Blunn Reservoir and Tucker Lake

Located between Hwy 93, W 66th Ave. & Virgil Way. North of Long Lake Regional Park. Park along the road near where Virgil Way curves into 72nd Ave.

It uses part of the Ralston Creek Trail. The trail heading uphill is a paved path that takes you on the north side of Blunn Reservoir. (Walk whatever distance you want to and then turn around and retrace your steps.) The paved path also connects to an unpaved 1.5 mile path that goes around the smaller Tucker Lake. You can do either or both! It is scenic with small hills and makes a great family outing. Dogs are welcome, but must be on a leash. <u>Click here for more info.</u>

Gateway Segment of Clear Creek Canyon Park

The Peaks to Plains trail, in Golden, along Clear Creek Canyon. Parking lot on 6th Ave. just west of Hwy 93 with permanent restrooms and shade structures.

This 1.75-mile trail connects with downtown Golden along Clear Creek and continues west to Tunnel 1 along US 6.

The Gateway Segment connects the Peaks to Plains Trail to the <u>Clear Creek</u> <u>Trail</u> in Golden, which in turn extends eastward and connects to Denver's <u>Platte</u> <u>River Trail</u>. To the west, the trail will eventually connect with other trails that wind through the Rockies. <u>Click here for</u> <u>more info.</u>

Vestry Corner

Vestry Update

In our March 2022 vestry meeting we had a short business meeting to get reports from the Finance and Property committees. Finances are continuing to be stable. Carpet in Kempsell Hall and the office area has been ordered and will subsequently be installed. The offices will also be painted. The vestry approved the purchase of a portable microphone to supplement our sound system in the Nave. The Vestry received new Shepherd's lists. You should be receiving calls soon.

We discussed the Bishop's new guidelines for COVID. We have moved to face masks **recommended** during service, but not required. Rev Margaret sent a statement to the congregation through Constant Contact. We will continue with communion (the bread) from little containers and still not have wine. The common cup will not be used any time soon. We will consider other ways to include wine in the communion. We will continue to social distance. We talked about starting to have Coffee hour beginning on Easter Sunday. The Vestry will supply food for this. Details will follow.

The Vestry is still working on interviews with candidates recommended by the Search Committee. We are looking forward to visiting with some in person soon.
