

Clergy Letter

Happy April, Happy Passiontide, and Happy Easter, CTK Family!

We've spent the past month together in the desert wilderness with Christ, reflecting on our faith, discerning where and how we might find ourselves confronted with God's love in surprising and inviting ways that encourage our healing and refreshment, and finding ourselves called out of the darkness of our own seclusion and alienation into the light of renewed relationship with God and one another.

In the coming week, we'll be journeying with Christ to Jerusalem for Palm Sunday, accompanying him through his last days before his arrest, joining in fellowship around the table as he washes his disciples feet as an example of the loving service he hopes they'll carry on in his name, praying with him in the garden of Gethsemane, watching with him as he is betrayed, arrested, denied, condemned, and crucified.

The Triduum of Holy Week—being the "three days" (triduum) leading up to Easter-is easily one of my favorite weeks of the Church year. Palm Sunday, we kick off Holy week with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem to shouts of "Hosanna," then progress into the Passion cycles for those who can't make it to the Triduum services. The liturgy of the Palms reminds us of the high expectations for the coming of Messiah as a conquering king. The people laid palm branches, as well as their own garments, on the road in front of the one they expected to ride into Jerusalem and overthrow Rome. The split-personality of the day demonstrates the response of anger and disappointment when Jesus not only did nothing to overthrow Rome, but rode into town, turned around, and left to go back to Bethany. Tensions mounted as he overturned tables and drove out animals in the temple, taught against the interpretation of Torah by the Pharisees, and ultimately allowed himself to be taken into custody by religious authorities whose power and privilege Jesus' teachings and actions threatened. The crowds that shouted "Hosanna" would just a few days later be whipped up by those religious authorities into the same crowd that would cry out, "crucify him" in Pilate's court. Expectations can be hard to change, particularly those attached to centuries of waiting for a specific manifestation of the promised Messiah to come.

Maundy Thursday is the start of the Triduum. We celebrate the Last Supper and Jesus' final teachings to his disciples. We mix John's gospel's washing of the disciples' feet with the other gospels' expression of the last supper as we transition from the readings and washing of feet into the gathering in fellowship around the table for Eucharist. We close the night with the solemn stripping of the altar and depart in silence without a dismissal, as the triduum continues on Good Friday. The beauty of the Triduum is that we take time to remember, meditate upon, and ritually relive each of the last days of Jesus' life. ciples, Jesus exhorts them to remember it, to practice it together, to keep it as a solemn and faithful tradition of bringing Jesus into their midst each time they gather—even after he is gone. His final teachings to them are a reiteration of all that he has tried to teach them over their three years together in ministry. It is a parting gesture and reminder that love, humility, respect, and mutual care are the foundation of our ongoing ministry as his disciples.

Good Friday, we commemorate the events that transpired after sunset on Thursday until Jesus' body was laid in the tomb on Friday afternoon. Christ's final prayers in the Garden of Gethsemane, his arrest, trial, crucifixion, death, and burial all represent the first day as we await his resurrection on the third day. Good Friday's noon service is the stations of the cross, remembering Christ's walk from condemnation to Golgotha. Before sunset, we'll gather again for our evening remembrance, reading John's version of the Passion, meditating at the foot of the cross, and departing again in silence. Having heard Matthew's version on Palm Sunday, we hear a different version on Good Friday, giving us a different perspective from which to contemplate the events that ended Jesus' life at the hands of the powers of his day. Again on Good Friday we depart in silence-the triduum isn't over until the dismissal at the end of the Easter vigil Saturday night!

From Friday's sunset until sunset on Holy Saturday is a time of waiting. In the cosmic bated-breath between Good Friday and the Easter Vigil, we plunge into the darkness of loss and rise again in the Easter hope that reminds us that even in the darkness of the tomb, God's love never stops, never fails, and ultimately triumphs over all the powers that sought to intimidate, oppress, frighten, and snuff out God's inexhaustible, passionate, and courageous love. It is, as Paul says, that "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rm 8:38-39). We hold a brief Holy Saturday service of readings and Psalms in the morning as we prepare for the conclusion of the Triduum Saturday night. With Saturday's sunset, we enter into the "third day," and we finally conclude our remembrance with the celebration of the Easter Vigil. Remembering the creation story, "there was evening and there was morning, the first day... the second day... the third day," evening is the start of each of our days in the ancient tradition of the church. This is why we celebrate the Easter Vigil on Saturday—the first fruits of the resurrection that we celebrate again on Sunday Morning. The Easter Vigil on

We rekindle the paschal fire on Saturday that was extinguished on Maundy Thursday after sunset. We read the sacred stories of salvation history, remembering God's work of creation, God's never ceasing care and reaching out to us as a human family, and finally we renew our Baptismal vows and proclaim Christ's resurrection with the shouts of A****ia! Finally, we arrive at the tomb with Mary Magdalene to hear the good news of Christ's resurrection and the evening's short, jubilant homily (by yours truly), we celebrate our first Easter Eucharist, and we leave to joyous hymnody and the dismissal.

The fellowship that we share over the Triduum and between Palm Sunday and Easter morning is one premised on a love that, even in death, can never be overcome. It is a love that inspires, heals, opens us up to one another, and draws us into our communities with a heart of service. It is a love that many, including myself and my family, have felt here at CTK, and which I am excited to be a part of nurturing, nourishing, and celebrating with you all in our first Easter together!

For the next fifty days following Easter, we'll be continuing to contemplate the mystery of the Resurrection, and what it means to be called into living as Resurrection people. We'll encounter the risen Christ in upper rooms, on country roads, in metaphors of shepherds and fruit, in commandments to love as Christ loved, and in prayers for our own call into the world to carry on in Christ's mission and ministry, culminating in the day of Pentecost and the coming of the Holy Spirit. All of this is an invitation to embrace the mystery not only of Christ's resurrection, but of our calling to participate in it as people living out resurrection hope in our often wounded, broken, "Good Friday" world.

As we transition from Lent to Easter this month, may we be blessed in the tensions that define our most dynamic season change from the darkness and despair of death and grief into the overwhelming joy and hope of resurrection, and may we each remember that no matter where we are in that spectrum between grief and hope in our own lives, God is with us, God is loving us, and God is seeking for our wholeness and peace.

Handbell and Vocal Choir Meetings




In April we will complete our in-depth study of Ibram X Kendi's work entitled *How to Be an Anti-Racist*. Studying this book together has been a powerful experience. We are grateful to Austin for his loving leadership in this study. If we have learned nothing else, we are all keenly aware of what Kendi means when he says *"There is no neutrality in the racism struggle...One either allows racial inequities to persevere, as a racist, or con*-

fronts racial inequities, as an antiracist. There is not in between a safe space of 'not racist.' The claim of 'not racist' neutrality is a mask for racism."

Recommended: The Night is Long but Light Comes in the Morning: Meditations for Racial Healing by Catherine Meeks, Foreword by Michael B. Curry. Catherine Meeks, Ph.D. is Executive Director of the Absalom Jones Center for Racial Healing in Atlanta, Ga. In a recent review Dr. Meeks is noted for her ability to shed light on racism and provide tools and experiences to enable faith communities to work to combat it. In this new book, she shares highlights

and insights from her journey and offers a much-needed meditative guide for the weary and frustrated. By looking inward and at each other clearly, she argues, good people of all backgrounds can forge a long term and individual path to making a difference. With personal stories and thoughtful direction, she takes the reader on the trajectory from self-awareness to recognition of the past to a new and individual way forward.





Recommended: Driving the Green Book by Alvin Hall. Road trips were a staple of many of our childhoods and a love we may carry even today. Yet imagine the road trip during **BOOK** the height of Jim Crow segregation when hotels, restaurants and gas stations were largely off limits to anyone who wasn't white. Enter the Green Book, an annual guidebook for Black road trippers. It was originated and

published by New York City mailman Victor Hugo Green from 1936 to 1967 and listed welcome resting spots in many American cities, including private homes. In this amazing book, broadcaster Alvin Hall sets up each chapter like a podcast episode, landing the reader inside richly-painted scenes and compelling conversations, from the husbandwife team who published the manual each year to the "sundown towns" that still unofficially exist today. Read the words-or listen to the stories come alive on the audiobook—in this engaging ride through history. Also available on your favorite podcast channel.

Vestry Corner April 2023

During the Vestry Retreat on Mar 11, the vestry reviewed the results of the Visioning meeting and chose several areas to concentrate on this year. We will be presenting them throughout the year and in our meetings. We will ask for your help and participation.

During the Retreat we also had our regular business meeting. Finances were reported and represent a shortage through February, but funds from December's Christmas offerings have allowed us to pay our bills thus far this year. We also saw a presentation on March 15 about a plan to put solar panels on the roof. We will be deciding if and when this will be a possible project. Long term it should help us with the electric and gas bill. We also have two possible organizations to rent our building this summer. We are continuing to look for other sources of income. We will have an audit in May by an outside person.

Our property report included that our Adopt a Plot map will be presented for parishioners to help with the weed control of the property. April 22 will be Cleanup day. Mike Paugh will continue to replace bulbs to help our power usage as well. We'll have another Family Film night on April 22 at 5:45 pm. The movie will be The Lorax. Kay Seiler will organize a Ladies Bunko on the Third Wed. from 11:00 – 1:00. More information will be available.

Easter and Holy Week Services are posted on a big sign that was previously used for the Wednesday Night Dinners. We are looking forward to all the services and culminating on Easter with a Pot Luck Brunch.

The Vestry will continue to Recommend but not Mandate masking in the building. With a couple of COVID positive tests reported, we will continue to recommend spacing and masks until spring after the yearly flu/virus season

Food For Thought



Feast Day of St. Mark Tuesday, April 25

The book of Acts mentions a Mark, or John Mark, a kinsman of Barnabas (Col 4:10). The house of his mother Mary was a meeting place for Christians in

Jerusalem (Acts 12:12). When Paul and Barnabas, who had been in Antioch, came to Jerusalem, they brought Mark back to Antioch with them (12:25), and he accompanied them on their first missionary journey (13:5), but left them prematurely and returned to Jerusalem (13:13). When Paul and Barnabas were about to set out on a second missionary journey, Barnabas proposed to take Mark, but Paul thought him unreliable, so that eventually Barnabas made one journey taking Mark, and Paul another journey taking Silas (15:36-40). Mark is not mentioned again in Acts. However, it appears that he became more reliable, for Paul mentions him as a trusted assistant in Colossians 4:10 and again in 2 Timothy 4:11.

Mark's symbol in art is a Lion, usually winged. In the

book of Revelation, the visionary sees about the throne of God four winged creatures: a lion, an ox, a man, and an eagle. (Compare with the cherubs in Ezek 1 and 10.) It has customarily been supposed that these represent the four Gospels, or the four Evangelists (Gospel-writers). One way of matching them is to say that the man stands for Matthew, whose narrative begins with the human genealogy of Jesus; that the lion stands for Mark, whose narrative begins with John the Baptist crying out in the desert (a lion roars in the desert); that the ox, a sacrificial animal, stands for Luke, whose narrative begins in the Temple, and that the eagle stands for John, whose narrative begins in Heaven, with the eternal Word.
