Clergy Letter

Happy August, Christ the King family!

As an adult, I still find it odd that we close out the summer well before summer is over. Traditions have shifted as the school year has started earlier and ended earlier than I remember growing up. It used to be that Labor Day was the signal of the end of summer and schools almost universally started on the Monday after

Labor Day (at least all the schools I attended in Oregon and California!). Generally, school let out after the first or second week of June, and the summer stretched out before us like a gift of time, leisure, and family vacations to various destinations (some of which were actually work for my dad). With my own children starting school now in mid-August, Memorial Day becomes the awaited day of release with the expectation of summer to stretch out beyond it.

As traditions of "autumn" and "summer" have shifted, some things have also remained the same. Much as we did when I was a kid, as we rapidly approach the beginning of the school year, my family scrambles toward the finish line of summer vacation by trying to squeeze every last breath of fun out of these final few weeks. Where it used to be the Labor Day fishing trip, camping trip, or barbeque; now Anthony's birthday always signals the last hurrah for our summers as August 11th is nearly always the week before school starts. The exception was last year in Santa Cruz, when school started ON his birthday (the first time he had been at school on his birthday in 13 years—he was NOT amused!). This year, his day includes a friend flying out from CA to spend the weekend with us from Wednesday through Saturday, our Nephew, Brandon, visiting on Thursday, plans for a long D&D game (Anthony's current favorite social activity), movies, food, and fun for all. We'll wrap up just in time for Sunday's post-church back to school shopping and then on Tuesday is the day all school children dread—the first day of school! (Actually, until this year, my boys on the Autism spectrum rather looked forward to schoolthough not the transition of the first day-since it meant the return of a set and regular schedule, which helped to regulate them).

Whether we have school-aged children in our families or not, the start of the school year--whenever it may be--still also signals a shift in the activity patterns of our local social lives. People return from vacation, expectations at jobs tend to intensify, grandparents who live near enough to provide daycare or after-school care are

tapped once again for the regular care cycles, and soon we'll begin to see the unseasonably early signs of the fall celebrations that lie ahead—just to remind us they're coming sooner than we may have time to realize.

As contemporary churchgoers, the patterns and traditions around summer have also changed. Covid has seen to it that most of our dearly held traditions have had to undergo serious consideration and transformation over the past couple years. Some of that has led us to new ways of gathering, new ways of worship, and new ways of fellowship together that we treasure and will bring with us into the future of Christ the King. Other ways were painful, and such things as the return of coffee hour have been a tremendous joy as we have taken back some of the dearest parts of our community life to also bring with us into the future. This process of transformation, while at times tumultuous, is also a process of waking up to the ways the Spirit is calling us to be more aware, more inclusive, and more flexible in our faith lives and family. Readings this month will include both comfort and discomfort as Jesus also challenged the people following him to become more open to God's unconditional love at work amongst them, through them, with them, and for them.

We may not know what the future holds in terms of Covid-19 and the transformation of the whole global Church of Christ, but that doesn't mean that we don't get a voice in how we address the shifting patterns of our global social order. So in addition to August kicking off the school year, it will also be a time of homecoming, of re-gathering for some community events that draw us back together as a parish family, and of dreaming of what we want for the future together. In the weeks and months ahead, we'll be working together to invite our community to gather. On Sunday, August 14th, we'll have a blessing of the backpacks at our 9:30 service for students and those returning to work after time off. On Saturday, September 17th, we'll have a parking lot movie night. On Wednesday, October 5th, we'll be having a celebration of New Ministry with Bishop Kym. And, later this autumn, we'll be sending out invitations to gather formally to dream together and set our vision for the next six years of ministry at Christ the King. Add to these the regular weekly opportunities to gather for learning, fellowship, prayer, worship, and study, and we've got a lot to look forward to together at Christ the King this autumn!

## Feast of Clare of Assisi Thursday, August 11

Clare Offreduccio, born in 1194, was the daughter of a wealthy family in Assisi. When she was eighteen years old, she heard a sermon by Francis of Assisi, and was moved by it to follow the example of the Franciscan brothers and

vow herself to a life of poverty. Her family was horrified, and brought her back home by force; but one night, in a gesture both tactical and symbolic, she slipped out of her house through "the door of the dead" (a small side door that was traditionally opened only to carry out a corpse) and returned to the house of the Franciscans. Francis cut off her hair, and placed her in a nearby convent. Later a house was found for her, and she was eventually joined by two of her sisters, her widowed mother, and several members of the wealthy Ubaldini family of Florence. Clare's best friend, Pacifica, could not resist, and joined them, too.

The sisters of her order came to be known informally as Minoresses (Franciscan brothers are Friars Minor = "lesser brothers") or as Poor Clares. When the order was formed, Francis suggested Clare for the Superior. But she refused the position until she turned twenty-one. They devoted themselves to prayer, nursing the sick, and works of mercy for the poor and neglected.

## Conversations on Racial Justice & Reconciliation Tuesday, August 9 & 23, 7:00pm on Zoom


"When Christ is the center, when we say yes to the way of unselfish, sacrificial love, then we do the work of racial reconciliation and justice. Then we're able to do the work of truth-telling and reckoning and healing. And then we can help our church and help our land be a land where there's plenty good room for all of God's children." Presiding Bishop Michael Curry, The 27th Presiding Bishop and Primate of the Episcopal Church.

Please join us on August 9th and August 23rd on Zoom as we continue our Conversations on Racial Justice & Reconciliation. What does it mean to live out the Gospel call to work for peace, justice, and reconciliation? How do we follow Jesus' teachings when the noise around us is too intense to bear? During August we will continue to discuss these important questions, keeping our lens on wisdom from our ancestors, our peers, leaders, and teachers, and keeping our feet on the path of love for all humanity and God's creation.

Did you know that the <u>Equal Justice Ini-</u> <u>tiative</u> (EJI) challenges racial and economic injustice and provides legal representation to people who have been illegally or justly convicted, unfairly sentenced, or abused in jails and prisons? Founded in 1989 by Bryan Stevenson, a widely acclaimed public interest lawyer and bestselling author of *Just Mercy*. For a rich learning experience visit <u>A</u> <u>History of Racial Injustice</u>, a digital experience calendar highlighting events on this day in history with interesting detail and intuitive sharing features.

**Ibram X Kendi** is a National Book Award-winning and #1 New York Times bestselling author of five books for adults and three books for children. Professor Kendi is a contributing writer at The Atlantic and a CBS News Racial Justice Contributor. As a group, we engaged in a months long study of Stamped from the Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America. This book uses the life stories of five maior American intellectuals to offer a window into the contentious debates between assimilationists and segregationists and between racists and antiracists across our country's almost 250-year history. This book was an eye-opening study for this conversations group, and is highly recommended. As a group, we are looking

forward to beginning another study of Kendi's work using <u>How to Be an</u> <u>Anti-Racist</u>. Watch the weekly newsletter and the Canticle for dates.

## Vestry Update

The Vestry welcomed Rev Austin to the first Vestry meeting of their tenure. While they have been busy introducing themself to the parishioners and getting to know many parishioners, Austin is feeling very welcomed. There will be neighborhood movie nights on the parking lot scheduled. Austin wants to begin a Visioning campaign. Austin has added a zoom component to the Sunday service. People can log into zoom and watch the live stream with others and after the service continue to "attend" coffee hour.

The finances are still behind, but we are looking forward to understanding what will be needed for the rest of 2022 and the budget for 2023. We thank everyone for the open plate and pledges received for July, we received over \$5,000. It has made a big difference. In August we will ask for your support of Peck Elementary School as is usual, then in September and October we will again ask for the open plate to support the General Fund.

The hot water heaters were replaced, and curtains have replaced the bulky doors in Kempsell hall and right outside in the hallway. We are looking at replacing lights in Kempsell Hall. The lights in the Nave will be put on hold at this time. Fixers and tenders have done some weeding but are avoiding the heat of the day.

With the rate of COVID infection still above 11%, the Vestry would like to continue to Recommend but not Mandate masking in the building. We will remove the capacity limit, but still encourage social distancing.
