Clergy Letter

Happy August, CTK Family!

As is my family's tradition, we are currently spending a week at Camp Galilee on the eastern shore of Lake Tahoe, where I'm serving as the visiting chaplain for the week. For a week each year, I spend time providing morning chapel, offering afternoon sessions of "stump the chaplain" (where the kids get to ask all their big questions, and I do my best to answer them), and, by evening, helping the camp director, Stuart, play guitar for campfire. Our boys are participating as campers, and Eva is working as support staff, while Jane gets a bit of vacation-time to spend at the lake and visit friends in the area before starting her first out-of-the-house job in 16 years! Serving as chaplain for the week became a part of our annual family tradition back in 2016 when I was invited to bring my family to Galillee and serve as the resident chaplain for the whole summer. I was working as supply clergy at the time, teaching college-level philosophy courses for a local charter high-school, and sending out application after application for tenure-track faculty positions. That summer, working at Camp Galilee, I realized how much I missed parish ministry. It became my transition point from looking fruitlessly for academic jobs to searching again for the parish ministry callings that feed my soul and bring me joy and hope.

August itself is a transitional month as teachers, students, and families with schoolaged children turn from our summer activities toward the start of the school year. I won't call it Autumn, as that doesn't happen until September 23rd, but it is a shift in our focus and our energy that draws us back toward home and brings the familiar structure and patterns of the "school year." For my family, that also mean's Anthony's fifteenth birthday, Eva's driver's license test, the last visits from far away friends, and the start of Jane's new job!

Here at CTK, we also have a transition point as we celebrate the feast of the Transfiguration on August 6th. From there, we'll pivot from gospels about what the kingdom of heaven is like to experiential gospels that demonstrate the importance of how we live our lives in the world. From the mountain-top, we next hear the story of Jesus and Peter walking on water, the lesson from the Syrophoenician woman, and Jesus' exhortation to the disciples not to tell people he's the messiah. Each of these ties into lived lessons and the organic process of forming relationship both with each other and with God. Summary of Solar System

Why did our CTK Vestry consider solar?

Our expenses and our limited budget were primary:

Each year, our electricity becomes more and more expensive. Looking at the ways we could help control those expenses, we looked at efficiency, which helps, and which Mike Paugh has done a tremendous job of helping us achieve with our updated LED lighting, but which doesn't control the raising rates of electricity. Looking at our campus, and the type of roof we have, solar was suggested as a way to stop the monthly rise in our electricity bill. So for the past five months, the vestry has discussed a solar system for our parish that could help alleviate these increasing costs. Our solar broker considered several solar contractors and helped us find the best rate for the best system as well as helping us figure out how to pay for it.

The most important factor in our decision were the models for cost, which locks in a set monthly bill at our current average electricity costs rather than continuing to escalate every year. The locked-in rate, which pays for our system, after twenty years also goes away and our electricity bill drops to just the administrative fees for being Xcel customers. At that point our savings become quite dramatic.

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Summary of Solar System Cont.

In addition to the financial benefits, we also reap an environmental benefit as we produce clean solar energy, reducing CO's need for energy from fossil fuels.

The System Cost: \$110,000 (incl. all admin/vendor/ construction fees)

How we pay for it: (Unless we have parishioners who are excited enough to cover part or all of the cost, the system is paid for by loans which set that unchanging rate of our monthly bill at our current average monthly electricity costs)

- * \$30,473 comes from a federal cash rebate (we take a bridge loan to cover that portion of the cost, which is paid back when we get our rebate).
- * \$79,604 comes from a Colorado PACE loan.
- * Total cost over 20-year loan: \$138,692
- * Total energy savings over 20-year loan: \$196,939
- * Net 20 Year savings: \$58,274 After which we save about \$15k+ per year because it's paid for! (By year 35, estimated total net savings are \$393,118)

The benefit:

Our electricity bill goes to \$0/month and the escalating costs of electricity are replaced with a fixed rate loan that is less than our current electricity bill.

Negatives:


While our electricity bill goes away, the monthly payment on the \$79k loan remains fixed at slightly less than our current average monthly electricity payment for twenty years. (We currently pay an average of

\$633/month and the loan payment is \$578/month).

There will likely be interest payments on the bridge loan totaling \$152/month once we have used that loan (we can use it last to save on interest payments). Those payments would continue until we receive our federal rebate. The vendors are donating \$1,000 to help offset the costs in the first year so that we roughly break even (it is estimated the system will cost us \$132 more in 2024 than our electricity will have cost us).

- * Annual Production: 48,692 kwh
- * Current Usage: 44,340 kwh (Pre-COVID19 numbers)



* Offset: 109%

Warranties

25 year production, parts and labor – Solar Panels 25 year parts and labor – Inverters

Monitoring

Church will have its own computer software for ongoing monitoring of the system for production.

Additional Service

Installer will visit the site twice a year to check system at no additional cost. Roof Inspection prior to installation included. Includes all engineering fees and permits.

Maintenance:

Solar systems generally require little or no maintenance since they are non-moving parts. It is recommended that you spray the panels once or twice a year with a hose to remove dust and dirt film. The solar installer has provided a complementary operating and maintenance service for the first two years after installation.

Installation:

The Installer will provide a draw down and installation schedule. Once financing is improved it is estimated that the system should be installed within approximately 120 days.

Federal Direct Pay Rebate:

The Inflation Reduction Act introduced a 30% Federal Direct Pay rebate to non-profits, exempt from income tax, who invest in renewable energy. Systems installed in 2023 are eligible to file for the rebate in 2024.

How do you get your refund:

- * Cash refund after filing of a tax return (Form 990-T/ Form 3800)
- * If you want to receive a Direct Pay option, you should pre-file with an online form that will be available later this year (Fall) -submit basic information to get a unique registration number.
- * You may transfer your Direct Pay to a third party; must fill out a transfer election statement.

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Saturday August 12 The Commemoration of Florence Nightingale 12 May 1820 - 13 August 1910

Florence Nightingale was an English social reformer, statistician and the founder of modern nursing. Nightingale came to prominence while serving as a manager and trainer of nurses during the Crimean War, in which she organized care for

wounded soldiers at Constantinople. She significantly reduced death rates by improving hygiene and living standards. Nightingale gave nursing a favorable reputation and became an icon of Victorian culture, especially in the persona of "The Lady with the Lamp" making rounds of wounded soldiers at night.

Her social reforms included improving healthcare for all sections of British society, advocating better hunger relief in India, helping to abolish prostitution laws that were harsh for women, and expanding the acceptable forms of female participation in the workforce.


