Clergy Letter

Happy December, Happy Advent, and an early Merry Christmas, CTK Family!

Here at the beginning of Advent, our family halls are already decked with a Fraser Fir Christmas Tree, and the full complement of lights and ornaments. As much as I have waited over the years to at least *decorate* the tree only in the last days of Advent, the past couple Covid Christmases have convinced me of the need for some brightness, joy, and celebration amidst this time of preparation. We'll of course continue to expand our repertoire to include mantle decorations, outdoor lights, wrapped gifts, candles, and other festive expressions of the joyful season to come, but waiting to play holiday music and light the tree is not part of this year's Advent for us! The final holdout is the Creche—which will only finally include Jesus on Christmas Eve night.

Advent, as a season of preparation, is a time each year when we delve into the mystery of the incarnation—Christ's birth as a human baby, bringing God's love very physically alive in our world in a way that had never occurred before. The readings of the season are characterized by prophetic messages of hope, peace, joy, and love; hauntingly familiar apocalyptic prophecies, songs of thanksgiving and jubilation, exhortations for repentance, and joyous angelic visitations exhorting trust, hope, and auspicious births. The complicated overlapping of themes throughout this season is quite nearly as complicated as our own overlapping experiences of mixed emotions of concern, hope, excitement, anticipation, and uncertainty; all mixed with apocalyptic news stories, as we scramble, pray, work, worry, and pine through these weeks in parallel with our lectionary readings. The popular song "We need a little Christmas NOW" dances on the edge of my consciousness while I'm writing all of this, and it brings me back to the reality of this year in our lives where anticipation has been such a familiar companion!

And yet...

Advent this year draws us into a different kind of anticipation and contemplation of what is to come. Light is being born into the world. We kicked off the new church year last Sunday with the reminder that what we do "while we wait" is of daily and moment to moment importance. We continue to adapt to the fast-pace of changes of our 2022 world. And yet, we are invited to take a step back during this season of Advent—to watch and wait as we lean into the hope and promise of God's incarnate word born into the world. Gathering together, that same light is reflected back to us in the faces of our own community of extended family. God's light is with us, amongst us, within us, and shining on us! The Christmas miracle toward which we

stretch in this season of anticipation is the miracle that pulls down the curtain that separates us from God and shows us God's own light dwelling amongst us in the face of the Christ Child. The invitation of the Advent season is to bid our hearts to prepare for the great mystery of just what God's light being born amongst us meant two-thousand twentytwo years ago, as well as what it means to us right here, right now, in our own lives and hearts and families in 2022. Beyond Advent, the Christmas Season bids our hearts to *participate* in the celebration of that light as we too have been born into and invited to carry God's light into our world. Further still, the season of Epiphany will nuance that invitation and calling as we seek God's light in unexpected places and listen for the new things God is calling us to in the new calendar year.

And so we find ourselves listening to the voices of the prophets, foretelling the coming of the One long promised, who would bring about God's shalom as a pervasive and deep abiding peace. We find ourselves listening to prophetic voices speak of familiar experiences of global confusion, uncertainty, and concern. We find ourselves listening to exhortations of repentance. And we listen to the prophets again calling for the high paces to be brought low and the low places to be raised up to make level ground for all people to see the coming of God's light and love into the world. Above all, we hear time and again that through it all, God is with us, loving us, and seeking every possible way to reach out to us—even to the point of walking amongst us as one of us.

My hope for each of us is that we find in this season renewed cause for hope, joy, peace, and love as we wait and pine in a different spirit of anticipation—one that captures all the excitement and celebration of watching and waiting for God's light to be born in the fragile infant flesh of the Christ Child.




Crafters of the King No Meetings in December


Activism Then and Now

Leininger is on vacation, we will have an open discussion on current items of interest. We will also discuss ideas, topics, books, etc. of interest for the coming year, 2023. Did You Know on Election Day, Louisiana voters chose to keep language in the state constitution that permits slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime? Unlike Louisiana, voters in Alabama, Oregon, Tennessee, and Vermont voted Tuesday (Nov. 8) to adjust the language in their state constitutions that could curtail the use of prison labor, which civil rights advocates say is tantamount to slavery. The 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, ratified by Congress on Dec. 6, 1865, states: "Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction." Similar language in several state constitutions include a loophole that advocates say permits authorities to exploit inmates, typically paying them pennies for their work. (Associated Press),



Feast Day of St. Thomas Wednesday, December 21, 2022

The Apostle Thomas (Hebrew or Aramaic for "twin") was also called "Didymus" (Greek for "twin"). He was absent when the Risen Lord appeared to the other apostles on the evening of Easter Day, and refused to believe that Christ had indeed risen until he had seen him for himself, but when he had seen Him, he said to

Him, "My Lord and My God." (John 20:19-29) Because of this episode, he has been known ever since as "Doubting Thomas." But we ought also to remember his earlier words, when Jesus announced His intention of going to the Jerusalem area, brushing aside the protests of His disciples that His life was in danger there, at which Thomas said to the others: "Let us also go, that we may die with him." (John 11:7,8,16) If Thomas was pessimistic, he was also sturdily loyal.

The Vestry will continue to Recommend but not Mandate masking in the building.
