Clergy Letter

Happy December, Happy Advent, and an early Merry Christmas, CTK Family!

With Christ the King Sunday and our festive potluck to commemorate our Feast Day behind us this past Sunday, we've officially made it through the long green growing season after Pentecost, and will finally arrive at our Church New Year this coming Sunday!

December is a magical month both in the Church and in our secular world as the anticipation of coming celebrations and the return of snow and freezing temperatures draw us into a different mindset than any other time of the year. The main difference, of course, is that while the stores started celebrating Christmas on October 30th with the sharp waning of Halloween sales, and the radios started playing Christmas music on November 19th (at 6pm), we in the church get a whole extra season of preparation beginning this Sunday, as we are invited into contemplation of the mystery of the Incarnation. In my family, it is a time of both secular and spiritual preparation as we bring home a tree and decorate it, make our home festive and warm, enjoy the seasonal music offerings on the radio, and yet also realize that Christmas doesn't end on December 25th, but only begins there! The joys of the secular preparations have become a part of the anticipation of our Advent season—drawing on the hope, joy, and love of the pre-seasonal festivities, we also seek out the moments of peace that give us pause to wonder in awe at the coming of messiah into the world (okay—at least that's what I'm doing!).

Each year as we enter into advent, we enjoy a season outside of (or at least along side of) the normal bustle of the commercial Christmas season. Advent is our time as a community and as individual families within our broader CTK Community to take a breath, make some space for quiet and prayer, to draw together and reconnect. It is our season of the hearth, the warmth of closeness of community that carries us through the winter season and from the darkness that culminates on December 21st, into the light and hope of the long ascent out of winter and back toward spring. It is the season of prophecies of the end times, as well as the season of prophecies of the coming of Messiah and the coming of the angel to Mary and Joseph proclaiming the imminence of Christ's arrival to those who will be his own parents.

As my two older children begin to age out of the childhood wonder of the magic surrounding them in our world, seeking opportunities to help them claim and live into the real magic of love, selflessness, and the joy of bringing that magic alive begins for us during this season of prophecies, anticipation, and mystery. The ways in which we look at the world through the eyes of faith and community brings the rich-

Who is St. Nick? Customs Around the World

In many places St. Nicholas is the main gift giver. His feast day, St. Nicholas Day, is December 6, which falls early in the Advent season. Some places he arrives in the middle of November and moves about the countryside, visiting schools and homes to find out if children have been good. Other places he comes in the night and finds carrots and hay for his horse or donkey along with

children's wish lists. Small treats are left in shoes or stockings so the children will know he has come.

Where St. Nicholas is prominent, his day, not Christmas, is the primary gift giving day. Parties may be held on the eve, December 5th, and shoes or stockings left for St. Nicholas to fill during the night. Children will find treats of small gifts, fruit or nuts, and special Nicholas candies and cookies. St. Nicholas gifts are meant to be shared, not hoarded for oneself.


The service of Compline "completes" the day; it usually takes about 20 minutes.

There will be no Open House Craft day in December due to the Holidays and the CTK Annual Craft Sale.


Faith Formation

Vestry Update

The financials for November still show a deficit to date. The open plate offering in December will be for the General fund hoping we can get closer to balancing our financials. Please keep paying your pledges and more if you can. What we do is because of your support. The Stewardship Committee has mailed the Pledge request letters and they are asking for \$275000 for the 2024 budget. Pledges can still be turned in this month.

Mike Paugh reported on some of the things that were completed. We have new Chapel Doors that are metal and close well. A day of cleanup on November 11 was held. The Fixers & Tenders will look at filters in the heaters and prepare for winter.

Austin reported that Mad Science has asked to use our building for two weeks in the summer of 2024. We will work with the YMCA to facilitate this request as well as the YMCA summer camp. Austin would like to see some services and activities that can be called "Fun Church" or maybe Episcopal "out of the box". Hopefully this might encourage youth and children to attend CTK. Our new bookkeeper Bethany Pedersen will start the process of changing our accounting software to QuickBooks Online. She will work with Ros starting December 11 to begin the transition.

Believe Out Loud is transitioning to a Welcoming Taskforce to continue the process a becoming a Welcoming Congregation per Believe Out Loud. They will be meeting twice a month and will be commissioned on the Sunday of the Annual Meeting in January. The Vestry and Austin will participate in a Mutual Ministry Review with the Diocese in February. The Christmas Tea and Craft Sale will be December 2 and Craft sale continue December 3 & 10.
