Happy February, CTK Family!

These past few weeks, we've reflected on stories of calling in our lectionary readings, as well as the Beatitudes this past Sunday of our Annual Meeting. We've reflected on God's presence with us, in us, and through us as God continues to call to us throughout our lives. We are called into relationship, into wholeness, into love and service, into life. Mistakes, blemishes, feelings of failure and all, we are called—and not in spite of who we are, but precisely because of who we are. We are God's children, loved without exception and without condition, and called into relationship with God and each other. We are called to see God's light in one another, to see the infinite facets of God's image reflected back to us in each person we meet and each encounter we have in this sacred and amazing world. We're called out of the darknesses of our lives—anger, fear, hurt, depression, hopelessness and despair, etc.—and into the light of God's love and healing. No matter what and no matter where we are in our lives or in our spiritual and emotional states, God is with us.

The season of Epiphany is a time of remembering the sacred stories of people of all sorts encountering God in unexpected times, places, relationships, and situations. It is a time of being reminded who we are in God's eyes, and who we are called to be as we seek to honor God's love for us by sharing it with the world around us. Struggling through times of loss, hardship, political upheaval, uncertainty, and confusion, we, along with the world around us, need this season's reminder of the new things God is doing, calling us to, and accomplishing through us. We are God's hands and heart working in our world to bring light, joy, love, and hope alive.

If we are each called by God (as I believe we are), the question for many becomes, how do we listen for, understand, and act on God's call if each person is called differently? First, as an affirmation, let me stress that I believe God prepares the called rather than calling the prepared. But if we've never been taught how to listen, how do we know? For most, the Spirit's call isn't a two-by-four kind of experience—it's more subtle. But if there is something positive in our community (or outside our community for that matter) that you feel tugged to do, or that won't seem to let you go, it may be a calling that is worth exploring. Callings aren't just to be prophets or clergy—they can be vocational and lifelong, but they can also be specific to a task or a purpose that has an end point. Frequently the best way to explore a possible calling is to do so in community discernment as a process of sharing and reflection. Is this something our community might like to learn more about? If so, I'd be glad to help get us started!




Faith Formation

CTK Book Club Mondays at 3:00p.m. on Zoom




We will continue to read Jon Meacham's new book, *And There Was Light: Abraham Lincoln and the American Struggle.* We will be reading Part II Chapters 6-9 and try to complete Part II within 2 sessions.

We have read Meacham's books before, and appreciate him as a writer and

an historian, as well as an Episcopalian who occasionally is heard at the Washington Cathedral. Quoting from the flyleaf: "Jon Meacham chronicles the life of Abraham Lincoln, charting how—and why—he confronted succession, threats to democracy, and the tragedy of slavery to expand the possibilities of America...This illuminating new portrait gives us a very human Lincoln—an imperfect man whose moral antislavery commitment, essential to the story of justice in America, began as he grew up in an antislavery Baptist community; who insisted that slavery was a moral evil; and who sought, as he put it, to do right as God gave him to see the right." Since it is a new book, it may be hard to get it in time at the library, but give it a try if that is your preference.

From the gray of Ash Wednesday to the brilliant dawn of Easter Sunday, the season of Lent is a journey through color. And so what better guides to this journey than the words of Scripture and the art of Henri Matisse, one of the most daring, influential artists in modern history?

In this devotional full of Scripture, art, and weekly practices, we walk alongside Matisse from his childhood in northern France to what he called his

"masterpiece," the Chapel of the Rosary in Vence, Paris.

He once said he liked to pray with a pencil: "At the moment I go every morning to say my prayers, pencil in hand; I stand in front of a pomegranate tree covered in blossom, each flower at a different stage, and I watch their transformation... filled with admiration for the work of God. Is this not a way of praying?"

So grab a pencil (or a paintbrush!), your favorite Bible, and a decent internet connection (all the paintings referenced can be found online) Week by week, we'll travel through the colors of Lent – all the way to the beautiful, joyful dawn of Easter morning.

development, chiefly simplification and the omission of letters. The Cyrillic alphabet with minor variations is used today for Russian, Ukrainian, and other languages of the former USSR, and also for Bulgarian and Serbian and formerly for Rumanian.

Thus the brothers were the first to produce written material in the Slavic languages, and are regarded as the founders of Slavic literature.

Feast Day of Cyril and Methodius Missionaries to the Slavs (14 Feb 869) Tuesday, February 14

In about 863, Prince Rotislav, the ruler of Great Moravia asked the emperor for missionaries, specifying that he wanted

someone who would teach his people in their own language (he had western missionaries, but they used only Latin). The emperor and the Patriarch Photius sent Methodius and his brother Constantine (Cyril), who translated the Liturgy and much of the Scriptures into Slavonic.

Since Slavonic had no written form, they invented an alphabet for it, the Glagolitic alphabet, which gave rise to the Cyrillic alphabet (named for Constantine aka Cyril). The resulting alphabet had 43 letters. It has since undergone



Conversations on Racial Justice and Reconciliation Monday, February 13 & Tuesday, February 28 7:00p.m. on ZOOM

"Changing a worldview ... happens over a lifetime, but it doesn't happen until people start thinking a different way." Grant Tinker, Professor Emeritus of American Indian cultures at Iliff School of Theology and a citizen of the Osage Nation.

Recommended: Many of us at CTK appreciate Fr. Richard Rohr's online daily meditation column and use it regularly as part of our daily devotions. Often the columns are Rohr's words himself, but also frequently

they include thoughts from a wide range of spiritual writers. Recently, the column shared the process of selecting and editing the column, and that process felt very familiar to

what we experience in our Conversations on Racial Justice and Reconciliation.

Ali Kirkpatrick described how the Rohr column comes together. "I look for material that can aid the process of integration, moving what we read from our minds to our hearts and out through our hands. I ask myself:

- * Does this engage my mind?
- * Does this soften my heart?
- * Is my stance toward 'the other' becoming less defended?
- * Does this meditation invite me to shift my behavior toward greater compassion, love, or justice?"

This sounds like an apt description of what we are trying to do in our readings and discussions on racial justice, and in particular, our broader experience of the role of the church in our lives. Our conversations often include a selected book for discussion. We also share other resources we come across each day in the news or other print and online material. Vestry Update

In the January Vestry meeting the 2023 Budget was reviewed. Larry Healy described the expenses that we incur to keep the church building running. He also gave us an idea of what income would be needed to meet that responsibility. Although our Pledges are higher than last year, they don't cover all ur necessary expenses We will still ask for Open offering. We will have the Open offering for Outreach in March, April and November and ask people to bring nonperishables in July. We will not forgo our Outreach either. We also would like to encourage everyone to register at King Soopers and buy our Safeway cards and purchase "gift cards" from RaiseRight. We do get rebates from the sale of the gift cards and a percentagle of your grocery and gas purchases at Kin Soopers when you designate The Church of Christ the King (Episcopal) in Arvada. We will also research other revenue streams and would ask any church member to let a Vestry Member know if they can recommend anything. We thank all church members for their financial support. The budget was approved and presented in the Annual Meeting.

We'll have another Family Film night on February 11 at 5:45p.m. The Vestry will set a date for a Retreat soon. The results of the Visioning meetings have given lists of people and possible project directions. The Vestry will use this as a basis for a Vestry Retreat.

Vestry members will be getting new Shepherds Lists. You should get communications from one of our Vestry member. The Vestry members include Kay Seiler, Rick Atkinson, Molly Foley-Healy, Nancy St. Pierre, Mike Barker, Jeri Burry, and Glenda Lutrell. You should hear from someone soon.

The Vestry will continue to Recommend but not Mandate masking in the building. We have had suggestions to remove the Blue Xes from the seats but we will continue to recommend spacing and masks until spring after the yearly flu/virus season
