Clergy Letter

Happy February, CTK Family!

This is the month of Valentines, of the Super Bowl, just last week our Annual General Meeting, and this Saturday our first Joyful Celebrations service! This month also continues our Epiphany Celebration as our lectionary readings maintain their focus on the revealing of God's glory and the new things God is doing in the world, bringing us to the 11th with the story of the disciples accompanying Christ to the mountaintop for the Transfiguration. Not the Feast of the Transfiguration, mind you, which happens August 6th, but each Epiphany we end the season with the story of the Transfiguration as we bear witness to the light that has come into the world, hear of the new thing God is doing in Christ, see his transfiguration in front of the disciples who have their own divine encounter in that moment of God's presence and leave transformed in their understanding—though not for long: on the way to the next town, they argue who will sit at Christ's right hand when he comes into power and takes David's throne in Jerusalem (despite Jesus having just told them, like the day before, that he would be crucified in Jerusalem).

It's somehow heartening to see the humanness of the disciples. Even right there with Jesus, doing the work of miracles, encountering God's physically audible voice, they just don't get it. They fight, they deny, they push back, they want to stay on the mountaintop, they forget, they get jealous, occasionally they're even petty and downright dense. It makes me wonder which of them might have had ADHD or Autism or anxiety disorders like me, Jane, and our kids, or any number of other conditions we experience in our social circles and communities, because in so many ways they were just like we are—removed by time and space and with cultural differences and worldviews, certainly, but every bit as human. The beautiful part is that so was Jesus. From his birth in the manger to age twelve, we know he moved from Bethlehem to Egypt to Nazareth, visited the temple in Jerusalem at least three times, and ditched his parents for three days as a tween when he stayed behind to teach in the temple. We don't know what happened in the eighteen years from age twelve to thirty, but we assume Joseph likely taught him to be a carpenter and likely died sometime before Jesus' ministry began (since he's never mentioned again in the gospel accounts after he and Mary find Jesus at age 12 teaching in the temple). The next time we see Jesus is when he is baptized by his cousin John in the Jordan, the dove descends on him, God's voice is heard proclaiming Jesus as God's son, and then Jesus departs immediately for his forty day sojourn in the wilderness where he presumably comes to terms with what has just happened, who he is, who

he is called to be, and what it all means to be both human and divine (as that's truly a lot to take in).

Even proclaimed as God's son, Jesus' humanness still shows through in his moments of reluctance, exhaustion, irritation, anger and indignation, mourning, anxiety, and fear—pushing back against his mother's request at the wedding in Cana, seeking alone-time to recharge multiple times throughout his ministry, telling off the Syrophenician woman who asks healing for her daughter during one such break, telling off Peter for tempting him to be the messiah everyone wants him to be, overturning the moneychangers tables in the temple, weeping at the death of a friend, and weeping again in the Garden of Gethsemane. Like him, we act out in our moments of weakness, anger, sadness, and despair, and like him, we too have been called into transformation and to serve the world as agents of God's love, healing, compassion, forgiveness, and peace. And so, with Christ, we too enter the wilderness for forty days on Ash Wednesday, to contemplate who we are, who we are called to be, and what the new light, new beginnings, new callings, and new creations we've explored throughout the season of Epiphany all means. Seems like we're in good company!

May the wilderness journey be one of discovery, transformation, hearing and heeding God's call, and finding the accompaniment of friends and family, along with Christ to make the journey light.

Lenten recommendations: Pick a new spiritual practice that ADDS something of value to your daily routine. Too often we give up something we enjoy to presumably remind us of God... but it seems to me that God also gives us the things we enjoy, so trying on something new in our spiritual practices offers us awareness of God without associating it with suffering. This may be why I love Lent rather than dreading it. Just a thought. ☺

Bible Study Group Tuesdays in February @ 12:30p.m., hybrid

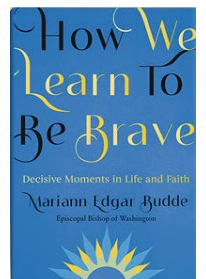

We will begin reading and discussing; *How We Learn to Be Brave*, by Bishop Mariann Budde. **An inspirational guide to the key junctures in life that, if navigated with faith and discernment, pave the way for us to become our most courageous selves, by the bishop of the famed Episcopal Diocese of Washington, D.C.** The decisive moments in life are those pivot points when we're called on to push past our fears and act with strength. Teachings, Reflections & Discussion

In the next step of Christ the King's Believe Out Loud discovery process, the Welcoming Taskforce invites you to participate in several upcoming community conversations. These sessions have been designed to:

- Answer questions raised from the community survey and 1:1 listening meetings,
- Provide us with another opportunity to share ideas, questions, and concerns about becoming a Welcoming Community with and for individuals who identify as LGBTQ+,
- Prepare CTK community members to "weigh in" prior to the Vestry's decision about becoming a Welcoming Community.

Because of the importance of these sessions, we will meet on the following Sundays for about an hour on the side of Kempsell Hall near the library. Folks will have time after church for fellowship and refreshments before each session begins at 11:15 am. Those who do not wish to participate in a session will be able to continue coffee hour at tables at the opposite side of the hall. Come explore with CTK members,

Episcopal Church leaders, and representatives from the greater Denver community. These are the dates and topics:

- February 18 - Why do the welcoming process if we're already a welcoming parish? w/understanding the Acronym LGBTQIA2+ and other terminology
- February 25 – Church Teaching on LGBTQIA2+: Spirit-led dialogue/transformation over the past 50+years
- March 3 - Scripture: Traditional Moral Teaching” and Contemporary Biblical Scholarship
- March 10 – The Science/Story/Wisdom of Gender & Sexuality, and Trans 101
- March 17 – Intersectionality: Welcoming and inclusion that celebrates and honors the totality of who we each are (i.e., gender, ethnic background, age, origin, etc.)
- March 24 (Palm Sunday) How will CTK implement being a Welcoming Community and prepare for possible external opposition?

This process and decision impacts all of us. We hope you will choose to attend all or most of the sessions during this Lenten season, which provides the opportunity to reflect on and deepen our call as Christians.

Vestry Update

The Vestry approved a \$296,325.00 budget prepared by the Finance committee to be presented to the congregation and the Annual Meeting on Jan 28, 2024. They reported 40 pledges of about \$197,000.00. With the assistance of Mirror Image Arts, AA open meeting group, Planina Choir and YMCA continuing to use out space this year and collecting open plate offerings we expect to be able to reach our budget this year. We will still collect open plate offerings for March, April and November for the Outreach committee to help support designated charities. We thank you for all your support.

Saturday, February 3 will be our first Quarterly “Joyful Celebration”. This is going to be a more relaxed service and hopefully interesting to families and youths. Austin called the services “Fun Church” will be organized with guitar music and contemporary music. We will have Healing Services on the 1st or 2nd Wednesday after Worship Committee meetings. More information will be available. Our Believe Out Loud journey will continue with information sessions for the entire congregation. Again look for more information to follow. We were advised that the Photo Collage would soon be available.

The nominees for the open Vestry spots were announced as Cathy Goodman, John Gianforte, and Jim Atkinson. The warden will be Barbara Jennings, Sr Warden and Mike Paugh, Jr Warden. We will have a Mutual Ministry Review with the new Vestry in February. We will also have a Retreat for the Vestry in February. February Vestry meeting will be held during the Retreat on Feb 17. The Vestry will host the Potluck at the Annual Meeting.
