Clergy Letter

Happy January, CTK Family! (and Happy 2023!)

This month we transition from the short and festive season of Christmas into the long (and still festive) green-season of Epiphany! Throughout Advent and Christmas, we prepared for and entered into the mystery of the incarnation—of God's love being born into the world in a way it had never been experienced before. With the coming of the Epiphany, we celebrate the visitation of the Magi to the holy family. Beyond this, we celebrate the revelation of God's light breaking through into our world in unexpected and transformative ways. Jesus' life and ministry taught us to renew our understanding of God's presence, accompaniment, love, healing, and grace—not as a far distant promise, but as an active and present reality breaking through into our lives and world here and now. This new season, we move from contemplation of the mystery of the incarnation into the time of looking for the breaking through of God's light into our own 21st century world; for the new things that God is doing in us and through us, and to the unexpected encounters and divine moments that catch us up into the sudden awareness of God's presence with us in the here and now of our lives. We're called into a new state of awareness of God's light and love, present in a very active and experiential way. Not one that seeks externally for the hope of God's presence and action in the world, but one that draws from our internal hope springing from our faith and experience of God's presence working through us to transform the world around us.

The difference between hoping for something external and the hope that springs eternal from within is a transformation of expectations and perspective that I've watched Marie go through and which I'm now watching my teenage son, Anthony, and tween son, Luke, struggling to make right now. It seems to hold within it the key to reawakening the magic of the world that children perceive as something external, and which eventually fades with the awakening of reason and experience that challenges and undermines their conceptions of the world around them. With Marie, I watched as things like the magic of Christmas, or wanting to reach out and touch the clouds, or even her innocent and uncomplicated belief in God gave way to cynicism about what the world is really like. She's regaining some of that hope and magic on the other side, but the boys are just entering into that same "age of reason" struggle. Songs like "Where are you Christmas," give testament to the common human experience of what they are going through right now, and I remember going through it myself as well.

In terms of my faith, I finally settled on the analogy of a cup that was filled to the brim when I was a child. It wasn't that my faith diminished, but that the cup grew until the undiminished quantity of faith in it didn't fill it anymore. When it got low enough in that growing cup, I left church—along with the image of God as a white-bearded old man in the clouds sitting on a golden throne. What I was seeking was a way to refill that larger cup, but I couldn't put words to it at the time. For me, as for many, the refilling of my cup came from a transformation of my heart, my faith, my understanding of myself, God, and the world (you know... just the little things). With this new awakening, God was no longer distant or uninvolved, but imminent (sometimes frighteningly so) and actively present in and through my life. And with this new awakening came a new perspective of joy, wonder, and faith that reawakened me to the magic of our world that comes from the kind of hope that transforms the external childhood magic into something truly transcendent.

I want that kind of hope for all of my children. And so I continue to try, as a parent, to help them to find their way to a deeper understanding of the true "magic" or spirit of wonder, joy, hope, and curiosity that once lay at the root of their magical perceptions of the world.

Epiphany is a time of transformation that invites us to seek God's light and God's unexpected presence in our lives and world. It is a season where we encounter and are invited into transcendent hope and into our own journeys of transformation. As we enter into this season of light, looking for the new things God is doing in us and through us, and as we enter into this new year of 2023 with all the promise of new beginnings that our next trip around the sun holds for us, may we bring with us the kind of hope that allows us to see, experience, and share God's love and goodness in all the unexpected turns the future holds.


Handbell and Vocal Choir Meetings

Several readers at CTK have indicated a desire to read Jon Meacham's new book, And There Was Light: Abraham Lincoln and the American Struggle. We have read Meacham's books before, and appreciate him as a writer and an historian, as well as an Episcopalian who occasionally is heard at the Washington Cathedral. Quoting from the flyleaf: "Jon Meacham chronicles the life of Abraham Lincoln, charting how—and why—he confronted succession, threats to democracy, and the tragedy of slavery to expand the possibilities of America...This illuminating new portrait gives us a very human Lincoln—an imperfect man whose moral antislavery commitment, essential to the story of justice in America, began as he grew up in an antislavery Baptist community; who insisted that slavery was a moral evil; and who sought, as he put it, to do right as God gave him to see the right."

The Book Club expects to start this new book the second week of January. Please let Jean Thayer or Merri Crawford know if you are interested, so we can coordinate a choice for day, time, and whether you prefer zoom or meeting at church (hybrid.) We plan to read the Prologue and Chapter One for the first meeting. Since it is a new book, it may be hard to get it in time at the library, but give it a try if that is your preference.

Food For Thought



Feast of John Chrysostom, Bishop of Antioch and of Constantinople, Preacher, Theologian, Liturgist Friday, January 27

John was called
"Chrysostom" ("Golden
Mouth") because of his eloquence. He was a priest of Antioch, and an outstanding
preacher. (Audiences were

warned not to carry large sums of money when they went to hear him speak, since pickpockets found it very easy to rob his hearers -- they were too intent on his words to notice what was happening.) His sermons are mostly straightforward expositions of Holy Scripture (he has extensive commentaries on both Testaments, with special attention to the Epistles of Paul), and he emphasizes the literal meaning, whereas the style popular at Alexandria tended to read allegorical meanings into the text. He loved the city and people of Antioch, and they loved him. However, he became so famous that the Empress at Constantinople decided that she must have him for her court preacher, and she had him kidnapped and brought to Constantinople and there made bishop. This was a failure all around. His sermons against corruption in high places earned him powerful enemies (including the Empress), and he was sent into exile, where he died. Along with Athanasius of Alexandria, Basil the Great, and Gregory of Nazianzus, he is counted as one of the Four Great Eastern (or Greek) Doctors of the Ancient Church. The Four Great Western (or Latin) Doctors are Ambrose, Jerome, Augustine, and Gregory the Great.


St. Clare's Table Tuesday, Janaury 10, 3:30 p.m.



Vestry Corner

Vestry Update

The finance report for December shows that we had about \$3000 more than expenses to continue to combat the 2022 deficit. While we don't balance for 2022 we have come much closer than expected with the help of pledges and open plate collections The first draft of the budget for 2023 shows the expenses will total about \$261,000. The finance committee expects that we will need to find new revenue streams. We will need to brainstorm ways of fundraising to meet this new budget. Stewardship committee confirms that we have 37 pledges for 2023 totaling \$175,440 so far. We will still be accepting pledges, but we will need more to support our expenses. We do have some accessible savings funds and with the continued support of open plate offerings we can narrow the gap. But we will need the help of other revenue streams. Stewardship will send thank you notes to those who have submitted their pledges. What we do happens only with your financial support. Thank you.

Mike Paugh reported that some outside light bulbs have been replaced. The property committee doesn't have any big projects due as of now but will continue to monitor and maintain our building.

The Worship committee reports a concern that people are not respecting the time of the Prelude during which one assumes an attitude of preparation for worship by not talking. The Prelude should be a signal of quietness. During the Coffee Hour we encourage talking and fellowship. There is a computer in Kempsell Hall to allow people not able to join us in person to enjoy Coffee Hour. We encourage all to come and chat with the folks on Zoom.

We have two nominees for Vestry members for class of 2023. We hope to have three by the time of the Annual Meeting in January.

The Vestry reviewed the activities this month including Movie night where we viewed "ELF" and enjoyed popcorn from a new popcorn maker. The night of Hymn singing was also enjoyed by many. One family found us on Facebook and came from Denver to join us. On Dec 21 our service of, Blue Christmas, was also found through our ads. These activities did not yield significant income but were meaningful and promoted fellowship and worshipping for our congregation and community at large.

The official name for the church is The Church of Christ the King (Episcopal). You may see Christ the King Arvada, Christ the King Episcopal or simply CTK. Any of these if acceptable on a check. Search Christ the King Arvada to find the Website for Christ the King Episcopal.

The Vestry would like to continue to Recommend but not Mandate masking in the building. We have had suggestions to remove the Blue Xes from the seats but we will continue to recommend spacing and masks until spring after the yearly flu/virus season
