Gathering Safely at Christ the King

The Vestry is in the process of finalizing plans for when we can gather at the church. Surveys were mailed out to each household—many thanks to those who have already responded. We do need to hear from as many people as possible so that we can

make good decisions about how and when we can open the building once again.

One reality has become abundantly clear: worship will not look, or feel, or sound the same when we first return—and it will likely be many months before this is true. We will all need to be wearing masks, all the time, along with consistently maintaining a minimum of 8 feet between household groups. There will be no congregational singing, no exchange of the peace, no communion, no coffee hour and only a limited number of people at one time.

I also invite you to think about gathering for something other than Sunday morning worship. We could start with a series of small (up to 10 people), socially-distanced picnics (sorry, no potlucks), an evening midweek prayer service outdoors, an outreach project, or a study group. For even though worship is at the center of our life together, it is not the only way that we are called to be the body of Christ in the world.

Open Offering for June Gifts for 2020 Arvada High School Graduates

Each year, a number of seniors who have completed their course requirements are unable to graduate because of unpaid fees. These may include fees for class items, athletic participation, lost library books, graduation, choir costumes, performing in the musical cast, or lost Chromebooks. (The cafeteria deficit was already covered by another donor.)

Uncollected balances are transferred as a student progresses through the school system. As many of these students have qualified for free or reduced lunches, it can be difficult for their families to cover the accumulated costs - especially this year. Clergy Letter

"Where Do We Go From Here?"

Dear people of God,

Only two weeks ago, the biggest concern that we had to address was when we might begin to reopen our church buildings. But the events of the past 10 days have brought into sharp focus the larger question of how our nation will respond to the death of George Floyd and the ongoing protests that have emerged all over the country.

We've known that the Covid 19 infection and death rates for communities of color are well above those of white communities, reflecting long-standing racial inequities in health care, housing, and employment. And in other times, the deaths of Ahmaud Arbery (February 23) and Breonna Taylor (March 13) might well have led to local protests. The videos documenting Floyd's death, though, have sharpened our focus on the daily threats to the health and safety of those same people so devastated by the coronavirus pandemic.

Let me be clear. I am totally opposed to violence and supportive of peaceful protest, for as long as people feel it is necessary. But I also recognize the deep truth expressed by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., in remarks he offered following several summers of racial unrest in the 1960's:

"I think America must see that riots do not develop out of thin air. Certain conditions continue to exist in our society, which must be condemned as vigorously as we condemn riots. But in the final analysis, a riot is the language of the unheard. And what is it that America has failed to hear? It has failed to hear that the plight of the Negro [sic] poor has worsened over the last few years. It has failed to hear that the promises of freedom and justice have not been met. And it has failed to hear that large segments of white society are more concerned about tranquility and the status quo than about justice, equality and humanity. And so in a real sense our nation's summers of riots are caused by our nation's winters of delay. And as long as America postpones justice, we stand in the position of having these recurrences of violence and riots over and over again. Social justice and progress are the absolute guarantors of riot prevention."

So the question before us is this: Where do we go from here? Where do we go as people of faith, who hear the words of the prophets telling us to "... let justice pour down like water and righteousness like an everflowing stream," who hear the words of Jesus telling us to "...love your neighbor as yourself"... who know that the Spirit is poured out upon *all* people? I wonder if we are willing to begin the hard work of healing the racial divide that has so devastated our communities, to hear the stories of fear and pain from those whose skin is different than our own?

I hope so. I hope that many of us will join in this work, learning how we can help to bring about the dream that God has for us all: to be members of a beloved community, beloved by God and loving one another. For it is only by learning to walk the way of love that we can reach this destination.

Parish Life

Vestry Highlights May, 2020

Reports received:

• Finance Committee: Bob DeLong reported that the audit committee is waiting to begin when it is safe to do so. The application for the Payroll Protection Program is still expected to be approved, although we are not sure of the timing of the approval process. The committee would also like the Vestry to appoint Steve Barritt and Rob Jones to serve.

- Treasurer's Report: Bob Delong reported that Unrestricted Pledges collected were above budget, and that the Unrestricted Giving is well below budget. This resulted in a net revenue over expenses of \$6,800. The coronavirus pandemic has negatively impacted the stock market and our Endowment Fund; some recovery is expected.
- Bob Mickelson noted that grass mowing has begun.
- Rev. Becky reported that a number of groups continue to meet regularly on line, and Martha Jones is working with Mike Orr to redesign our website. We recently received an unrestricted gift from the estate of Connie Fellers; she recommends moving this gift into the endowment fund. She also presented the guide from the diocese about how and when we might reopen our building.

Actions taken:

- ◆ Approved a motion to add \$2,000 gift from C. Fellers to the Endowment Fund.
- Approved appointing Rob Jones and Steve Barritt to the Finance Committee.
- Began reviewing plans for resuming worship services and other programs and decided to meet on June 9 to make more definite plans.



The more tightly we are attached to Jesus, the more purely His love can pass through us.


And oh, what a love it is!
