

From the Senior Warden

Bishop Kym recently sent her guidelines for the Diocese of Colorado. As the rules for reopening our communities are changing for the country and our state of Colorado, we must formulate how to re-gather at Christ the King.

From the Bishop:

"While the CDC's new guidelines are welcome news for us as individuals, they complicate our common life as the Body of Christ. Most congregations are made up of vaccinated, partially vaccinated, and unvaccinated persons. As we consider how we will regather, we must hold in mind all of the young people and those with medical conditions that prevent them from being vaccinated.

Each congregation will have to make difficult decisions rooted in the needs of each community. There is no "one size fits all solution for us. The events of the last year were traumatic, and each of us is processing what recovery looks like in our own way, at our own pace."

Our initial phase of regathering will be to allow twenty-five people to gather in the Chapel beginning on Sunday, May 30, June 6 and June 13 for Sunday Morning Worship. We will reassess the situation after this trial period to see how it goes and what are some of the challenges that we need to address. If you do not make the sign-up list for a Sunday you are invited to receive communion in the chapel immediately following the service until about 11:15am. We also ask that you allow others to sign up on alternating weeks so that everyone gets a chance to attend in person.

We are aware that this situation is both temporary and not our final goal. We know that for some it is frustrating that twenty-five will not get all of us back in the building but it is a start and we must start somewhere. The chapel allows us to have all windows open, fans on allowing for maximum circulation of outside air in the space.

As we assess the airflow in the Nave, we will consider including that space for our worship services in future weeks. We know we are all anxious to "go back to normal" but we also know that not all of us are vaccinated and cannot assume all will be vaccinated. We will still ask people to wear their masks and socially distance. We are discussing resuming some form of Coffee hour outside and will keep you informed of that in the coming weeks.

From the Junior Warden

The number one priority of the Property Team right now is to get us back to face-to-face worship services. The way we are going to get there is to assure that our buildings meet the criteria for meeting safely. According to all of the information we have, the best way to do that is to increase airflow in the meeting space to acceptable levels.

Steve Barritt and I have met three times over the past few weeks with two different mechanical companies to assess our air handling equipment and determine whether it is adequate. The latest meeting was with our long-time mechanical company, Murphy Mechanical. The engineers there know our building and systems very well and will be doing an assessment to let us know what works, what is broken, and what we need to do to get our congregation back in the nave for services.

As part of the cleanup day on May 15, a group of parish volunteers cleaned up the chapel so we are able to meet there now. Thanks to all who came and worked on that project. A special thanks to Larry Healy for washing all of the screens for the south facing windows.

We will be moving forward on recommendations from Murphy as fast as we are able to. I am hopeful that we will be back in the nave as soon as possible and be able to meet in the parish hall, offices, library and other spaces as a parish soon. We are also considering the best ways to open the space for outside groups but our current focus is Sunday mornings and the office areas. The work will be in stages and may take some time to complete but we are eager to

move the process along. The Property committee and Vestry will continue to work on regathering.


Please remember that not everyone in our parish has the same experience nor the same opinion about regathering or vaccines. We are trying to make the best decision possible for the whole using the resources available to us at this time. The process will likely feel slow but I remind you for some it already feels too fast. We will not all be in the same place on this topic but please remember we are in this together.

We will continue to inform you of changes when information is available. Feel free to reach out to us with questions or concerns. Know that God has been with us through this pandemic and will remain with us as we come out of it. Let's keep in mind what Saint Julian (May 8th) heard from the Lord, "All shall be well and all manner of things shall be well."


Bible Study Group Tuesdays, 2:00pm on Zoom

Vestry Update

The Vestry received a report from the Search Committee about their progress. We expect the Survey of the congregation to be completed by the congregation by June 9. Please complete when you receive it. Call the office if you need a paper version.

The Property committee is getting information from Murphy Mechanical to improve the airflow in the building. They will look at repairs to existing systems and check the air quality possibilities for all the sections of the building. Mold and water leak problem in the offices is being examined. The Chapel was cleaned up during the last Clean Up day. Vestry approved the landscaping of the South area of the church. The Climate Care group will be putting a barrier and rocks on the South side of the building where there is little water and a lot of weeds.

With the Chapel cleaned, we are planning for regathering in the Chapel with limited numbers of people. For the next few weeks we will meet together in the Chapel with people reserving limited spaces. The service will be live-streamed through YouTube. Distribution of communion will be available for all in the chapel at 11:00am. Parking Lot Chat hour continues. We'll continue to plan for further in church possibilities.

The Vestry will be looking for people to be on the Stewardship committee and other possible committee members.

Food For Thought



The Martyrs of Uganda Thursday, June 3, 2021

On 3 June 1886, thirty-two young men, pages of the court of King Mwanga of Buganda, were burned to death at Namugongo for their refusal to renounce Christianity. In the following months many other Christians throughout the country died by spear or fire for their faith.

These martyrdoms totally changed the dynamic of Christian growth in Uganda. Introduced by a handful of Anglican and Roman missionaries after 1877, the Christian faith had been preached only to the immediate members of the court, by order of King Mutesa. His successor, Mwanga, became increasingly angry as he realized that the first converts put loyalty to Christ above the traditional loyalty to the king. Martyrdoms began in 1885. Mwanga first forbade anyone to go near a Christian mission on pain of death, but finding himself unable to cool the ardor of the converts, resolved to wipe out Christianity.

The Namugongo martyrdoms produced a result entirely opposite to Mwanga's intentions. The example of these mar-

tyrs, who walked to their deaths singing hymns and praying for their enemies, so inspired many of the bystanders that they began to seek instruction from the remaining Christians. Within a few years the original handful of converts had multiplied many times and spread far beyond the court. The martyrs had left the indelible impression that Christianity was truly African, not simply a white man's religion. Most of the missionary work was carried out by Africans rather than by white missionaries, and Christianity spread steadily. Uganda now has the largest percentage of professed Christians of any nation in Africa.

Amen.
