Clergy Letter

Happy June and happy summer, CTK family!

Welcome to the green growing season of "after Pentecost." Ordinary time, as it is actually called in the liturgical calendar, stands not for "normal," or "mundane" but for "ordered." These are the numbered Sundays that span from Trinity Sunday (this weekend) until Advent, which include many favorite stories from the Gospels: miraculous healings, the sending out of the disciples, kingdom parables, walking on water, the healing of the Canaanite woman's daughter, and the parable of the 10,000 talent debt, as well as some difficult stories like the parable of the killing of the landowner's son and confrontations between Jesus and the religious authorities. This is a season of watching Jesus' ministry grow in the regions around the Sea of Galilee as he demonstrates his mastery over sin, sickness, the natural world on land and sea, as well as his authority over the scribes and Pharisees whom he teaches about the law in new and astounding ways. As the stories unfold over this summer and this coming fall, we journey with Jesus and his disciples throughout the regions of their ancient world where ministry, worship, prayer, and action are all bound together in the single mission of Christ to bring all the abundance of God's love to bear on the world around him—a mission we share as agents of God's abundance here in our time and place.

Appropriate to this time of year, we'll also be travelling around the regions of our own contemporary world as members of our CTK family depart to and return from destinations far and wide, and we welcome our summer visitors from the YMCA's summer camps! My own family will be heading up to Sioux Falls South Dakota in the first week of June to visit my dad for the first time in five years, and Eva leaves for her summer as a camp counselor on Lake Tahoe (Camp Galilee) on the 21st after coming back from the diocesan mission trip the second week of June. Later this summer, we'll join Eva at Camp Galilee, where I'll serve again as chaplain for a week of spiritual retreat and adventure for teens ages 13-15, and where Anthony and Luke will get to spend a week at camp as well!

As we contemplate the ongoing work of the Holy Spirit during this busy family time of summer, we are reminded of the many ways that the coming of the Spirit turned the world upside down in the early church, as well as throughout our history as followers of Christ. We continue to be renewed, shaken up, turned around, and set on the path of God's love in new and surprising ways—most of which, over the course of human history, have been countercultural challenges to learn and grow into broader and deeper understandings of God's love.

Of the many ways our perspective has been broadened, this month's Denver Pride Celebration reflects an amazing growth of our understanding of God's love and care for all people, not in spite of who we are, but precisely because of who we are. The "ALL" who we claim in the Episcopal church to welcome has, over the past two



What is grace? What if we as Christians have been focus- ing too much on the relationship of grace to our sins and not enough on how God's grace is connected to our goodness? Hildegard of Bingen was a 12th century abbess, preacher, musician, herbalist, painter, and poet who often wrote about the greening of God being the life force



that is pulsing throughout the universe, nurturing God's love and good-ness in everything that is. Come green the goodness of God's grace in your life through this interactive series where we will be creatively making our ideas and questions of God's grace and goodness in our lives and reading *Christ of the Celts: The Healing of Creation by J. Philip Newell.*

This series will be co-led by Rev. Dr. Austin Leininger and Angela Hummel. Angela has a BA, and MA in Theology and is currently working on her Doctorate in Ministry at Illiff school of Theology. Angela has created a method for exploring ideas and questions about God through making art, what she calls, Art Theology. Her ideas have been published by TEDx and the Wabash foundation. Food For Thought



Wednesday, June 14 Feast Day of Basil the Great Bishop, Theologian (14 June 379)

Founded a monastic settlement in 358. He remained there only five years, but the influence of his community was enormous. Whereas in the West there are numerous monastic orders (Benedictines, Carthusians, etc.), in the East all monks are Basilian monks. His Longer Rules and Shorter Rules for the monastic life remain the standard. Basil expresses a definite preference for the communal life of the monastery over the solitary life of the hermit, arguing that the Christian life of mutual love and service is communal by its nature. In 367-8, when Cappadocia suffered a severe and widespread famine, Basil sold his family's very extensive land holdings in order to buy food for the starving, persuading many others to follow his example, and putting on an apron to work in the soup kitchen himself. In this crisis, he absolutely refused to allow any distinction to be made between Jew and Christian, saying that the digestive systems of the two are indistinguishable. He also built a hospital for the care of the sick, housing for the poor, and a hospice for travelers.

Food Pantry

One of the many things that got suspended during the pandemic was our tradition of collecting food for our pantry. This ministry went away when we stopped meeting each week. We have started collecting food again over the past several weeks and have already had an occasion to provide food to some people who needed it.

If you have food to donate, this is the process. There is a large basket next to the sound board in the back of the Nave. Bring your food on Sunday morning and place it in the basket. The ushers will take the basket up along with the collection plates. After the service the basket will be taken back to the kitchen and the food placed in plastic bins.

Austin has people visit on Sundays and throughout the week requesting assistance. Having food on the shelf gives him a resource to provide food to those who request it.

If we start collecting more food than needed, we will take the excess to Community Table, the food bank, or other organizations that need it.

A Note from the Outreach Team

I want to thank the encouraging response from the congregation for new members on the Outreach Team, and for a volunteer to take over the Outreach Team leadership role. Eight of us met Thursday, May 25 (7 present, 1 on Zoom), with three others interested but not able to attend that day. We briefly addressed the usefulness of some coordination of the many service opportunities CTK members are involved in, and want to explore that further in future Outreach Team interactions. Vestry Corner for June 2023

Financials in April included many gifts for Easter and other money beyond the pledges. This left us ahead for the year. We again received \$17359.52 in pledges alone and \$689 for the St Francis Center. We thank you for your generosity. Everything we do is because of your support.

We did have a meeting with David, the person with the solar panel information. We did not get an update of the proposed cost for the panels. We also are to get some information about the lights in the Nave. We will have to have another meeting before the Vestry can act on this. We will continue to look into the possibility of getting solar panels and repairing the Nave lights.

New names were added to the Church directory and you may be getting calls, emails, letters from a different Vestry member. It was also announced that we are returning to using the Common Cup during communion, on July 2. Gospel singing will be held on Fridays through the summer with more details to follow. The Christmas tea was set for Dec 2. Carols and Cookies will be on Dec. 8. And The Blue Christmas service will be on Dec. 21. The Vestry was commissioned on May 14 and those absent on that Sunday were commissioned on May 28. Worn books of Common Prayer will be replaced. The Journey to Adulthood Service was celebrated on July 21. Austin will be out May 28 (after service) until June 3. His summer vacation will be in July/ August, July 30 thru August 12. The Vestry will not meet in July.
