Clergy Letter

Alleluia! Christ is risen! Happy Easter and happy May, CTK family!

May has come and Mother's Day is rapidly approaching. This month, we continue our Easter Celebration until the Day of Pentecost on the 19th as we also progress through the festive transition from spring into the end of the school year and summer "break" (for our children anyway) at the end of the month—wow that's soon!

As we continue to seek in our liturgies to enter into the mystery of the Resurrection, our readings this month transition to the foreshadowing of the coming of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost. Called to be resurrection people in our own time and world, we too are also called into the gift of the Holy Spirit and to the work of living as Christ's hands and heart in our word beyond the season of Easter. Over the past month, we've been exploring what it means to live into the mystery of being called as Resurrection people, but the enormity of the occasion is part of why this fifty-day-long season is as long as it is. Christ's disciples struggled to believe that he had been raised until finding Christ alive in their midst. The raising back to life of someone who had been executed and laid for eternal rest in a tomb was no more expected in their time than it is in our own, yet Jesus' followers kept encountering him until they could no longer NOT believe. In the garden outside the tomb, Mary Magdalene came to believe. Locked in the upper room, encountering Jesus twice, the apostles, finally including Thomas, came to believe. On the Emmaus road, two more disciples walked with Christ, who became known to them in the breaking of the bread only to return to Jerusalem and find that Peter too had seen the Lord, and then Jesus was there with them a third time and asked them for some broiled fish to eat. And on the mountain, Jesus bid them all farewell, commissioning them to preach the gospel to all—regardless of nation of origin.

However we may take these stories of faith and divine encounter, the mystery of Easter invites us into God's love as a power stronger than death and the grave, that rekindles hope, light, and life within us. With the outpouring of the Gift of the Holy Spirit on Cornelius' household, who were all Gentiles, this Sunday we are invited to continue to marvel at the love of a God who sees no divisions between God's children, but only sees each of us as beloved and called into divine relationship. From the very beginning, humans have struggled to understand God's love, inclusion, and

Contemplative Prayer Tuesdays at 12:00p.m., hybrid



This is the Nobel winner's classic look at Job and seven other Biblical characters as they grapple with their relationship with God and the question of His justice. "[Elie] Wiesel has never allowed himself to be diverted from the role of witness for the martyred Jews and survivors of the Holocaust, and by extension for all those who through the centuries have asked Job's question: 'What is God doing and where is His justice?' Here in a masterful series of mythic portraits, drawing upon Bible tales and the Midrashim (a body of commentary), Wiesel explores 'the distant and haunting figures that molded him': Adam, Cain and Abel, Abraham and Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, and Job. With the dramatic invention of a Father Mapple and the exquisite care of a Talmudic scholar, Wiesel interprets the wellsprings of Jewish religious tradition as the many faces of man's greatness facing the inexplicable. In an intimate relationship with God it is possible to complain, to demand. Adam and Eve in sinning 'cried out' against the injustice of their entrapment; Cain assaulted God rather than his brother; and Abraham's agreement to sacrifice his son placed the burden of guilt on Him who demanded it. As for Job, Wiesel concludes that he abdicated his defiance as did the confessing Communists of Stalin's time to 'underline the implausibility' of his trial, and thus become the accuser. Wiesel's concern with the imponderables of fate seems to move from strength to strength." -Kirkus Reviews

In the April 21st, Perspective section of The Denver Post, there was an article entitled "Producer Responsibility should improve state's recycling rate", by Katherine Goff, President of Colorado Communities for Climate Action, and Kevin Bommer, executive director of The Colorado Municipal League. With Colorado recycling only being at 16%, less than half of the national average, there is a newly adopted Producer Responsibility program, the third of its kind in the USA, that will provide automatic recycling services to people living in urban or rural areas, that will also have a standardized list of acceptable materials to be recycled throughout the state. This new program will be funded by the consumer brands or producers who sell those products in Colorado.

- 3. Lincoln's Bishop: A President, a Priest, and the Fate of 300 Dakota Sioux Warriors by Gustav Niebuhr. The "Bishop" refers to Henry Benjamin Whipple, Minnesota's first Episcopal bishop, who met with President Lin-

- coln 1862 in an effort to intervene on the side of justice and mercy in the uprisings between Dakota Sioux and pioneering families.
- Reading the Constitution: Why I Chose Pragmatism, Not Textualism, by Stephen Breyer, Associate Justice, U.S. Supreme Court from 1994-2022, about his philosophy of interpreting the Constitution.
