### Clergy Letter

Happy November, CTK Family!

As the colder temperatures of late autumn begin to chill our days and freeze our nights, we enter into the month of Thanks with our All Saints celebration this Wednesday following on the heels of one of my children's favorite fall holidays, Halloween. Luke has been collecting autumn and Halloween decorations for the better part of a month already, with his room looking particularly festive. The yard, in the meantime, has become home to some of the more macabre decorations of the coming festivities, and our cars are filled with autumn and Halloween playlists to help transition us into the longer oncoming chill (we may have just had our first snow on Saturday, but we'll be in the 60s again for the next week).

November has become for many of us a month of giving thanks—for all those who have gone before us on All Saints Day, as well as with the secular Thanksgiving holiday that takes us to Christ the King Sunday on November 26<sup>th</sup>. Throughout this month, we'll be seeking opportunities to give thanks for the inviting warmth and festive gatherings both at home and at CTK that nurture and warm our hearts.

Reflected in our readings this month, we hear the beatitudes, the parable of the talents, and the exhortation to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, welcome the stranger, and visit those in prison. Opening our hearts and minds to these scriptures in the context of giving thanks for all that we have helps us on a spiritual level to find true gratitude for the presence of God's abundance in our lives in whatever form it takes. A Lakota conception of each person recognizes that God fills each of us, as a glass of water is filled to the top, but each is given different portions of different gifts. Our job is to recognize, give thanks for, and utilize the gifts we've been given to the fullest. I like this conception as it recognizes that each person, regardless of level of ability, regardless of financial means, regardless of health, regardless of gender, regardless of race, regardless of any artificial division we place between ourselves to compare our worth to that of another, is whole, filled to the top with God's goodness and gifts, and each person has something to contribute to the community as we seek to gladden the hearts of those who journey this life with us. Marking each week of our month of Thanks with these readings is a marvelous way to remind us who we are, whose we are, and why we do what we do as followers of Christ.




#### Online and In -person Services Available

#### **Vestry Update**

The financials for show a \$1200 deficit to date. We are falling a bit behind. Please keep paying your pledges and more if you can. What we do is because of your support. Molly Foley-Healey reported that Stewardship Committee has mailed the Pledge request letters. They are asking for \$275,000 for the 2024 budget. Pledges are to be turned in on Christ the King Sunday November 26. We do have money coming from renting the building. Mirror Image Arts is renting the south classroom upstairs, AA open meeting group is meeting on Wed. evenings, and the Planina Choir meets on Thursday evenings. This should bring us about \$10,000 next year.

Mike Paugh reported on some of the things that are scheduled to be completed. They will fix the Chapel Doors. A day of cleanup on 11/11 is scheduled. They will look at filters in the heaters and prepare for winter. Solar Panels are on hold as of now since the information about a tax rebate has not been formalized for a group that is a non-profit. We will continue to look for a way to finance replacing lights in the Nave.

A statement of Land Acknowledgement has been approved to be read at appropriate times during the year. Believe Out Loud is transitioning to a Welcoming Taskforce to continue the process a becoming a Welcoming Congregation per Believe Out Loud. The Vestry and Austin will participate in a Mutual Ministry Review with the Diocese. The Christmas Tea will be December 2 and the Craft sale dates are December 2 & 3 and will continue on December 10.


