Happy October, Christ the King Family!!

From St. Francis Day (*this past Sunday*) to All Hallows Eve on the 31st, October is a month filled with reminders of autumn and the coming again of our harvest festivals that will lead us this and next month into Advent and Christmas beyond. In our community, we prepare for our Celebration of New Ministry on Wednesday, our Visioning Conversations that will guide our focus and efforts for the next set of years, and rejoice in getting to enjoy celebrating our autumn festivals together in person! Outside, leaves are already changing color, our grocery stores are displaying the end of the month revelry of All Hallows Eve (Hallow e'en) that comes just a day before our All Saint's Day celebration, and mountain-snows have begun!

Each year around this time (though it seems to come a few days earlier each year), pumpkins and pumpkin-flavored foods and beverages make their return to our hillsides, stores, and décor. Food For Thought

Feast of Teresa of Avila Mystic and Monastic Reformer Saturday, October 15

Teresa de Cepeda y Ahumada (later known as Teresa de Jesus) was born in Avila, Spain, 28 March 1515, one of ten children whose mother died when she was fifteen. Her family was of partly Jewish ancestry. Teresa, having read the letters of Jerome, decided to become a nun, and when she was 20, she entered the Carmelite convent in Avila. There she fell seriously ill, was in a coma for a while, and partially paralyzed for three years. In her early years as a nun, she was, by her account, assiduous in prayer while sick but lax and lukewarm in her prayers and devotions when the sickness had passed. However, her prayer life eventually deepened, she began to have visions and a vivid sense of the presence of God, and was converted to a life of extreme devotion.

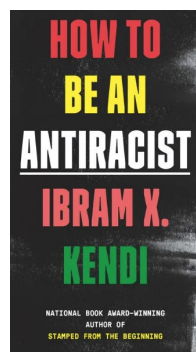
Conversations on Racial Justice and Reconciliation Tuesday October 12th & October 26th 7:00 p.m. on Zoom

"Where you see wrong or inequality or injustice, speak out, because this is your country. This is your democracy. Make it. Protect it. Pass it on." — Thurgood Marshall

In a continually shifting national and world landscape, we believe these conversations are more important than ever. Please join us as we continue our journey to expand our knowledge of history, enhance our awareness of situations and policies that stand in the way of racial justice in our community and nation today, and explore avenues of action that bring needed change.

Did You Know: In 1935, Nazi Germany passed two radically discriminatory pieces of legislation: the Reich Citizenship Law and the Law for the Protection of German Blood and German Honor. Together, these were known as the Nuremberg Laws and they laid the legal groundwork for the persecution of Jewish people during the Holocaust and World War II. When the Nazis set out to legally disenfranchise and discriminate against Jewish citizens, they closely studied Jim Crow Laws in America. Learn more from *Hitler's American Model* by James Q. Whitman. According to Whitman, "Nazi lawyers were interested in, looked very closely at, [and] were ultimately influenced by American race law." This topic is also widely referenced in Isabel Wilkerson's widely read and excellent book *Caste: The Origins of our Discontents*.

Recommended: *The US and the Holocaust*, a 3-part documentary by Ken Burns that tells the story of how the American people grappled with one of the greatest humanitarian crises of the twentieth century, and how this struggle tested the ideals of our democracy. The documentary is available now on PBS. **Our group is committed to watching and our October meetings will be dedicated to a discussion of this documentary.**



Coming Up: On November 9 we will begin an in-depth study of Ibram X Kendi's work entitled *How to Be an Anti-Racist*. According to one reviewer, "Kendi weaves an electrifying combination of ethics, history, law, and science with his own personal story of awakening to antiracism. This is an essential work for anyone who wants to go beyond the awareness of racism to the next step: contributing to the formation of a just and equitable society." Rev. Austin Leininger has graciously

agreed to lead this study and we encourage everyone interested to join in. The book is available on Amazon and at your favorite library. Please watch the weekly CTK bulletin for more information and prepare for the first study by reading the first two chapters of the book.
