## **Clergy Letter**

Happy October, CTK Family!!

With the Autumnal Equinox behind us and the days already a bit shorter than the nights, we arrive in October with the promise of harvest bounty and thoughts of preparation for the winter months ahead. Jane has already scheduled our sprinkler blowout for later this month, and at my house we've already enjoyed the first fruits of the harvest with Pumpkin bagels and Luke's first batch of chocolate chip pumpkin muffins.

This time of year we are reminded of what it takes to survive the darker months of autumn and winter as we plan for our own families as well as for our parish family. More than any other time of year, the reminder of the importance of community draws us together for the feasts and festivals that will lead us this and next month into Advent and Christmas beyond. Outside, leaves are already changing color, our grocery stores are displaying the end of the month revelry of All Hallows Eve (Hallow e'en) that comes just a day before our All Saint's Day celebration, and the early mountain-snows have already begun (though the first one from last week has also already melted)! Inside, we prepare to celebrate St. Francis Day this Sunday, as well as to kick off our Episcopal 101 Forum—meeting throughout October, and we look forward to our October Family Movie Night (Hocus Pocus) on the 28<sup>th</sup> just before our celebrations of All Hallows Eve on the 31<sup>st</sup> and All Saints Day on November 1<sup>st</sup>.

Autumn is a time of annual gatherings as a parish family to remember who we are and whose we are as we bless our pets, take stock of our finances and plan for the year to come, remember that stewardship is a ministry of keeping our community open and vibrant, and begin the liturgical and festive planning that leads us into the high holiday seasons that begin with All Saints on November 1<sup>st</sup> and take us through to Epiphany in January. There is so much to recommend this time in our church year, and so many opportunities to gather for fellowship and fun!

Yet, for all that we are planning and doing this month, at the heart lies the ongoing desire to find community with one another, to be in fellowship, to worship together, and to bring our faith to bear on the significant times and seasons of our lives and world. #### **Vestry Update**

The financials for August were presented and show some positive numbers. We are able to pay our bills and keep up with our necessary expenses. What we do is because of your support. Molly Foley-Healey reported that Stewardship Committee will be starting our annual pledge drive. You can expect a letter in October. Mary Beattie reported from the Outreach Committee that they are asking for another month of open offerings to support the Charitable organizations they have designated for 2024. We will review that after the annual pledge drive. We are very happy to help them as we can to support these organizations as we are able.

Mike Paugh reported on some of the things the Property Committee has completed. The kitchen sink has no garbage disposal at this point. So put any garbage in the trash. The water problem in the Youth Formation Office was taken care of. Hopefully they were able to fix the leak on the roof. The Chapel doors were addressed because of their problem of sticking. The problem of the lights in the Nave will be researched. We will look to replace the lights with better functioning light and replacing the cylinders that have fallen. This will be a \$18,000 -\$20,000 project. We will be looking for means to fund this.

The Contract for David C. to continue our pursuit of the Solar Panel project has been signed and we are waiting on in-

formation about the funding. The Vestry voted to approve the use of an office near the old Chapel by Mirror Image Arts and Teresa Mazza. They will rent the South classroom. Delegates will be attending the Diocesan Convention in Grand Junction: Larry Healy, Barbara Jennings, Jeri Burry as well as Rev Austin Leininger.

#### Mirror Image Arts at CTK Open House, Sunday, October 15

Mirror Image Arts has moved into the building. They can be found in the south classroom upstairs and will be offering an open house meet and greet on Sunday, October 15 after service. The team spends most of their time working remotely and will be in and out of the building, Mirror Image Arts is a non-profit and here's what they do:

### Our programming works with and for young people in education and the youth legal system.

Our facilitators are skilled theatre makers, first aid mental health youth certified, with ongoing training in relevant evidence-based practices (positive youth development, social-emotional learning, trauma-informed care, healing-centered engagement, culturally responsive teaching, and restorative practices).

Goals for all of our programs include:

•Provide youth with a safe, caring relationship with a trusted adult

- •Co-create spaces of belonging where youth AND youth -serving adults can build self-awareness, connection, empathy, compassion, and nervous system regulation
- •Offer youth-supported spaces where they can process their emotions, practice bold decision-making, and reflect on the results of their choices
  - •Role model for youth how resilience can be expressed so they can navigate complex social situations and come back stronger
  - •Assist schools and juvenile detention centers in their move from punitive disciplinary practices toward positive youth development and restorative and healing-centered engagement practices

- •Show up with Authenticity/Vulnerability
- •Cultivate spaces of Curiosity & Courage
- •Foster and Nurture Trust
