Parish Meeting on October 4

There is one item of business to complete at our parish meeting: approving the Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation. The Vestry decided in 2016 to review this document, along with our bylaws, for two reasons: 1) our previous articles and bylaws had been approved more than 15 years earlier and 2) a new template for the articles was available from the Diocese. The time seemed appropriate for such a review.

Although new bylaws and articles were approved at the Annual Meeting in 2017, it appears we didn't read all the fine print. After several attempts were made over the next 18 months to secure diocesan approval of the articles, Rev. Becky was finally able to get the articles to Larry Hitt, the Diocesan Chancellor, in April of 2019. At that time, Mr. Hitt informed us that we needed to make several changes in order for the document to be approved. The Vestry addressed those changes in the next several months, but the work was set aside during Rev. Becky's sabbatical leave so that more immediate concerns could be addressed.

The final draft of the Amended and Restated Articles of Incorporation was approved by the Vestry on January 21, 2020. The Vestry could not bring them to the

Annual Meeting for approval, however, because the parish must receive notice—and a copy of the articles—at least 30 days in advance of the meeting. The Vestry had planned to present this document to a special parish meeting in April, when the parish would also approve the fundraising plan for replacing the flooring in Kempsell Hall. The Covid 19 pandemic derailed those plans, along with many others.

In addition to approving these Amended and Restated Articles, Bob Mickelson and Barbara Jennings will also be describing how you can help to make the parish function smoothly during the transition following Rev. Becky's retirement. Please plan to attend this meeting; your voice is important.

Update from the Senior Warden

On September 8, the Vestry and members of the congregation met (by Zoom) with Canon Vanessa Stickler-Glass, the member of the Bishop's staff who works with parishes during transitions in clergy leadership. A <u>video of her presentation and responses</u> to questions is available here; the steps in the transition process are outlined on the Transition Timeline (see page 11).

Since then, the Vestry has interviewed a candidate to serve as the Transition Priest, whose background check has been completed and who Bishop Kym has approved. The Vestry still has to negotiate the Letter of Agreement before any announcement to the parish.

Keeping Up with Business During Transition

The ongoing work of the parish does not end during a transition in clergy leadership. In particular your help will be needed in the following areas: Property, Safety (especially related to Covid), Stewardship, Care Team, Communications, and Worship

The service of Compline "completes" the day; it usually takes about 20 minutes. Merri Crawford will begin leading this service each week; others are welcome to share leadership with her as you become familiar with this service.

Morning Prayer - Fridays, 8:00am

For at least 15 years, a small group of people has offered Morning Prayer at Christ the King. Sally Campbell initiated this service, and different people have participated and led since then. Now, you can join in from home. Ros Patterson and Jean Thayer will lead the service; others will be welcome to share leading as you are comfortable.



Clergy Letter

Saying Good-bye during the "Season of Covid"

Dear People of God,

A few weeks ago, at one of the innumerable Zoom meetings with the Bishop's staff, someone shared that he or she (I can't remember who) had begun to call this past six months the "Season of Covid." It isn't, of course, an official liturgical season—somewhere in the background we have moved through Lent and Easter, and into this season of "Ordinary Time"—but it has been hard to tell the difference. The best we've been able to do is to begin holding services outdoors, but last Sunday's cold and wind was a stark reminder that this, too, must end.

And yet, many of you braved the weather and the pandemic to come so we could celebrate Eucharist together, while six of you were able to share the sacrament with eleven more people, so they could be a part of our offering of thanksgiving. The service was awkward and somewhat rushed, as part of the equipment began blowing around the parking lot and some received communion in their gloves, but I know it meant a lot to me to be able to offer this gift of God's grace to you.

But before I go, I want to thank you all for the privilege of serving you here at Christ the King. I have appreciated your willingness to trust me with your confidences, to allow me to walk with you in your grief, to experiment with worship and faith formation, to approach me with new ideas, and to support my efforts to help us grow as members of the Body of Christ.

For you have helped me to grow in my own faith and understanding of how God is at work in the world and among us. And I have all confidence in the Spirit, who will continue to guide all of us as we now follow different paths as we continue to grow and practice the Way of Love that Jesus taught.

So this is the last time I will be writing to you as your priest. Many of you already know that, once I leave at the end of this month, I will not be available to you to respond to your questions or concerns; that will first be the responsibility of your transition priest and later your new rector. As hard as this will be for all of us, I ask you to please observe this distance. Saying good-bye during this time will be a lot like our Eucharist last Sunday—somewhat rushed and awkward, but even in this moment, we can trust that God's grace will abound.

Looking Ahead

It has been a joy to gather with one another as we offered worship "On the Tarmac" these past several weeks, ending with our first Eucharist celebration since March. The incidence rates of new infections appear to be dropping once again, which will allow us to begin worship inside on October 11. Please be aware, however, that should these rates increase once again, we will need to return to only online worship.

As before, the following guidelines will be in place:

- Make your reservation by Thursday either through the online link or by calling the church office (Limit 40)
- Stay home if feeling sick.
- Enter through the main doors at the south end of the building.
- Wear a protective face mask at all times.
- Maintain at least 6 feet of distance between self and any other non-family member person.
- Use hand sanitizer when entering the worship space.
- Sit only in the marked seating areas.
- Use the bathrooms located directly adjacent to the narthex, and follow the posted directions for sanitizing after use.
- Notify the Rector or Sr. Warden if one is diagnosed with COVID-19.

Above all, we ask that you recognize your responsibility to help keep other members of our community safe when gathering for worship. We will need to record who is present, so that in case of an infection we can assist with contact tracing. If you are diagnosed with COVID 19, please let us know as soon as possible. As awkward as this seems, it is truly the only way we can safely begin to worship together again.

Online Worship Continues Sunday Morning Prayer, 10:15 a.m.

We will continue to offer Morning Prayer through Zoom on Sundays for the foreseeable future, for we know that many

folks will be hesitant to gather, even with our safety protocols in place. The 10:15 time will remain the same for October 11 and October 18; the times for October 25, Rev. Becky's last Sunday, will be announced as soon as possible.

Many thanks to Andi and Jeff Smith and Michelle Bredine, who have provided music for the online service, which has added so much to our worship experience. Parish Life

Vestry Highlights September, 2020

Reports received:

- Finance Committee Report: Kay Seiler presented the findings for the fiscal year 2019, noting a few items that need attention, particularly the fixed assets. The committee recommended reports be approved by Vestry for approval.
- Treasurer's Report: Bob Delong reported that income is tracking slightly over budget and expenses are tracking below budget. The endowment funds have recovered most of their earlier losses. The PPP loan cannot be converted to a grant until the bank receives procedures for conversion.
- Bob Mickelson noted that several sumacs along the east edge of parking lot were damaged in the storm and need to be removed. The locust tree near the building will be trimmed in October.
- Rev. Becky reported that nine groups continue to meet regularly on line. She told us that the Bishop's staff has okayed the plan for indoor worship. She also asked for the Vestry to help develop the agenda for the Parish Meeting on October 4 and recommended that folks begin organizing for the transition at that time.
